

Ann Kitajima, Assistant Director Morro Bay National Estuary Program "The State of the Eelgrass: A Morro Bay Update"

The Morro Bay National Estuary Program works to protect and restore the Morro Bay estuary and its watershed for people and wildlife. For the past 25 years, the Estuary Program has focused on three programmatic areas to achieve its goals: monitoring & research, restoration & conservation, and education & outreach. The Estuary Program tracks long-term conditions in the estuary and watershed, protects land through restoration and conservation easements, and works with visitors and residents alike to share a message of stewardship.

The Estuary Program works to monitor, protect, and restore habitats. Eelgrass is a flowering plant that puts down roots in our bay and serves many important ecological functions. Our bay experienced a precipitous eelgrass decline in 2009 to less than 20 acres. Since 2017, we've seen eelgrass recovering, and in 2021 we mapped a record 500 acres of this seagrass. In her presentation, Ann will discuss the current state of Morro Bay eelgrass as well as the results of some recently completed research.

Ann Kitajima joined the Estuary Program in 2002 as their Monitoring Program Manager, focused on directing and overseeing monitoring efforts throughout the bay and creeks. In 2016, she became the Assistant Director, with responsibilities including programmatic oversight, strategic planning, and grant management. Prior to her time with the Estuary Program, she worked as an environmental consulting conducting permitting and remediation projects throughout California. She holds engineering degrees from UC Berkeley and UC Irvine and has been a Central Coast resident for over 20 years.

Freddy Otte, Biologist for City of SLO

Freddy has been the Biologist for the City of SLO for the last 17 years (and all in City Hall!) and even though he is a general biologist, most of his work focuses on water quality and watershed management in support of our local fish species. He works on flood control, fuel reduction and infrastructure project development, implementation and biological/ compliance monitoring for those projects too.

Climate change is going to impact our creeks and ultimately the fish that are supported in the watershed so looking at climate adaptation projects for multiple benefits for our community and watershed is a key task. Before starting at the City he worked for Central Coast Salmon Enhancement which is an intermediary in the fish hatchery system and then they started working on watershed management plans which helped him get to where he is now at the City.

Being in constant contact with state and federal resource agency staff is another benefit for the City and the fish. He has many projects under development and construction and is excited to discuss them here tonight. Here's a preview of our 2023 meeting speaker schedule. We're pleased that 7 of our 10 monthly meetings will feature in-person speakers, while our 3 zoom speakers are very well known to the fly fishing community.

MEMBER PROFILE

Don Wheeler



I first began fishing with a fly rod when I was very young, but not in the traditional manner. My dad taught me to turn over rocks in Western Sierra Slope streams and capture stonefly nymphs as live bait to cast into pocket water. It was a highly effective technique even for a six year old.

During the next several decades I fished using both conventional and fly tackle and was always held back by my lousy self-taught fly casting ability. By dumb luck, dogged determination and help from a couple of fly fishing buddies, I managed to catch a few trout or steelhead on nearly every trip and continued fishing until a work transfer took the family overseas. For the next fifteen years of being moved around by work, fly fishing didn't happen as I wasn't creative about fishing for non-salmonoids.

After moving back to the Central Coast, an acquaintance who wanted to start fly fishing again, approached me about joining him for a trip or two. Starting with a trip to the Kern River, this began a great friendship that has taken us to Northern California many times, 6-7 trips to Baja California, a couple of trips to Alaska and countless days on local beaches fishing for surf perch. We both have a particular passion for catching saltwater species and do so mostly on DIY trips.



In 2015 we learned about the Santa Lucia Fly Fishers, joined the club and began participating in the Spring Casting Clinics. With a lot of help from Bernard Pieters and the other casting instructors I became a far better caster, perhaps with not a lot of finesse but able to cast an 8-10 weight rod for hours on end.

The Santa Lucia Fly Fishers has provided me new partial competence as a fly angler, access to fishing companions and allowed me to participate in many club activities. In 2022 we gained the added benefit of access to Santa Rita Ranch and the special bass angling to be had there. In 2021, I became a member of the Club Board of Directors and in the beginning of 2022, I agreed to a two year term as Club Secretary. I am glad that I can pay back a little to this Club.

Tenkara Clinic Outing Recap By Ken Baldwin



The Tenkara clinic was held on October 8-9 on the lower Owens River just outside of Bishop California. Attended by Steve Soenke, Carol Ray, Wayne Peterson, and the three Jims: Snodgrass, Davis, Sasules, and Ken Baldwin, we met our guide/instructor Pat Yeager early on Saturday morning at the Pleasant Valley Campground located at the start of the special regulations section of the Owens River.

The first day of the clinic was spent on how to manage the twelve-foot telescoping rod and how to cast the fixed line with some accuracy. With the basics understood, Pat situated each of us on a section of the river to practice our casting and line control. Since the day was hot with the temperature in the mid-80°s, surface activity was minimal making us fish with various nymph patterns. By one o'clock, we all were exhausted by the heat and with only a few fish to show for our "new" fishing skills ended the first day's clinic with a well earned packed lunch. That evening the group, including Wayne's wife Lois, all met at Taqueria Las Palmas in Bishop for a Mexican dinner including margaritas and beer.

Sunday morning we all met at Rock Creek campgrounds, located halfway between Bishop and Mammoth Lakes, where Pat demonstrated various dry fly casting techniques. We were then on our own to fish for small brookies in the pocket water, but as the air temperature was in the low 30°s (at 8000 feet of elevation) the fishing was SLOW. By the time the clinic ended it had warmed up but the fishing remained disappointing. Some of us spent the rest of the day fishing on the upper Owens and Hot Creek with some fish reported being caught.

Other Upcoming Outings By Lew Leichter

Plan to attend our 2nd Annual "Squeeze the Last \$ from your 2022 Fishing License Surf Perch Outing". Meet at the far left end of Avila Beach Saturday morning **December 31st**. Try to arrive at sunrise, fish a couple of hours and hit Fat Cat Cafe for breakfast. Contact Rick Saval or Mark Shelton for loaner gear if needed.

January 24th to 26th Salinas River Striper and Surf Perch Outing.

The river is only open to fishing Wednesdays & weekends during steelhead season and the weekends are a zoo. So drive up Tuesday fish the river Wednesday fish the surf Thursday and head home. Here are details: **December 1st** is the opening day of central coast steelhead fishing but stripers in the lagoons, like that of the Salinas, get just as much, if not more, attention. Though they don't belong in our coastal streams, they provide a much-needed recreational fishery when the steelhead aren't around. The thing to keep in mind is that, until the State and the Feds figure out striper-specific regulations for the coastal streams, they fall under the same regulations as steelhead with regards to season and special requirements. The season runs from December 1st through March 7th, ON weekends, Wednesdays and legal holidays plus the opening and closing days of the season regardless of the day of the week they fall on. **Additionally, even though you might be targeting stripers, you must have a steelhead report card in your possession. Two stripers of 18-inches or longer may be kept...and please do keep them.**



You will have to fish from a float tube, pontoon boat, pram or kayak on the river as the shoreline is choked with tulles. Once in the water, your next task is to find the schools...but do so quietly as motors and loud splashing spooks them. Generally, the water isn't very deep so an intermediate or type 3 sinking line works fine. If you're using denser lines, you might have to strip the line in sooner rather than letting it sink deeper. For flies, the same patterns you use anywhere else will work here (chartreuse clousers and gurglers for top water.

Bigger surf and bigger perch up here so a 6 to 8 weight rod with a fast sink tip line short mono leader and weighted surf flies. NOTE CLUB HAS LOANERS IF NEEDED & A FLY SHOP IN CARMEL FOR FLIES.

The public fishing access directions: From Hwy 1, take the Del Monte Blvd. exit and, if coming from the south, drive straight to Monte Rd. If coming from the north, take the Del Monte Blvd. exit and turn left. The next left will be Monte Rd. Cross over the Salinas River and turn right onto a dirt road to the parking lot.

With support from the Bishop Chamber of Commerce, the event is being produced by the Southwest Council, Fly Fishers International. This event will provide outdoor fun in a safe and beautiful environment during a time of year that offers very productive angling opportunities with minimal crowds on the water.

CDFW Celebrates 50 Years of Wild Trout Waters



The California Department of Fish and Wildlife (CDFW) is celebrating the 50th anniversary of the first designated "Wild Trout Waters" in the state, a pioneering wild trout conservation and management practice at the forefront of the nation's modern environmental movement of the 1960s and 1970s and a designation still benefitting California anglers today.

The California Fish and Game Commission created CDFW's Wild Trout Program in 1971 at the urging of California Trout, the nonprofit, San Francisco-based wild trout conservation organization formed the same year. CDFW's Wild Trout Program – today called the Heritage and Wild Trout Program – was created in recognition of the need to protect and enhance the state's wild trout fisheries while also maintaining wild trout fishing opportunities for the public. The program was born at a time when the national consciousness was becoming attuned to negative impacts on natural resources, including population declines among fish, wildlife and plant species.

In 1972, the Commission designated 17 streams as Wild Trout Waters and has added to those waters every year since. Under the California Fish and Game Code, the Commission is required to add at least 25 miles of stream and at least one lake to the program annually. Among those first 17 Wild Trout Waters were portions of the North Fork American River, Hat Creek, Fall River, the Eel River, the Owens River and Hot Creek. Many of the first designated wild trout fisheries are still recognized today by trout anglers throughout the country.

"The founders of the Heritage and Wild Trout Program were truly visionary a half century ago, and we certainly owe them a huge thanks for the conservation of these very special places and these very special fish," said CDFW Director Charlton H. Bonham. "What I most appreciate about the program is its dynamism. It continues to grow and adapt, adding more waters and more special fishing opportunities every year while managing through our contemporary environmental challenges the founders of this program never could have imagined – a changing climate, epic drought, devastating wildfires and a human population approaching 40 million California residents."

"This anniversary is a huge milestone," said Curtis Knight, executive director of California Trout. "CalTrout has been proud to promote and partner with CDFW on the Heritage and Wild Trout Program since its inception. We believe this program was progressive and cutting-edge when it was established in the 1970s. Today it has evolved and continues to be one of the most effective fish water policies in the country."

Earlier this month, the Commission added two new waters to the program: The North Fork Mokelumne River, which flows through portions of Alpine, Amador and Calaveras counties, and Silver Lake in Tulare County have both been designated as Wild Trout Waters.

Since its founding, the main charge of the program has been to manage and enhance California's wild, self-sustaining trout populations. The program was expanded in 1988 to include conservation of native trout species within their historic ranges and renamed the Heritage and Wild Trout Program. In 2003, the <u>Heritage Trout Challenge</u> was launched to encourage anglers to explore waters that support native trout species. Anglers that catch any six of the state's qualifying 10 native trout species from their historic drainages are recognized by CDFW with a personalized award for their accomplishments.

Over the years, CDFW's Heritage and Wild Trout Program has had far-reaching impacts on fisheries management and angling culture by:

- Raising awareness and education of California's native trout species
- Driving monitoring and formal management plans for trout
- Fostering a catch-and-release fishing ethic that today is commonplace as the standard practice to protect self-sustaining wild trout and other fisheries
- Managing for genetic integrity by avoiding stocking hatchery trout into designated waters and working to prevent hybridization
- Serving as an example for other states to promote fishing and conservation of their own native trout species and catch-and-release fishing. The 12-state, <u>Western Native Trout Challenge</u>, for example, was modeled after CDFW's Heritage Trout Challenge.







