#### MAXIMA/RIO LEADERTIE FORMULAS

The following leader formulas have proven to turn over, out cast, and outlast any tapered leaders I've ever used. They were developed while experimenting with different length/diameter sections over a period of 36 years. The formulas may be varied slightly without loss of performance. On smaller streams, the shorter leaders tied with Maxima leader material are the most accurate for getting under overhanging limbs and rock structures. Maxima has the stiffness and scratch resistance that makes a perfect basic leader on which to attach chosen tippet sections. On long, flat pools and tail waters, I use the longer formulas. The Maxima sections help to turn over the longer leaders well. I have changed to Rio for all the tippet sections. Rio has the breaking and knot strength, suppleness, and low visibility that I desire.

Unlike many leader formulas that have such short middle sections, tippets can be replaced several times on these leaders without having to replace the sections immediately next to the tippet. Some substitutions can be made. Damaged sections can be easily replaced without having to discard the whole leader. Try not to vary the sections more than .003" difference between leader sections to get proper turnover. If your leader is to be attached to a 7 weight line or larger, consider using a short 30 pound section of Maxima between the line and the 25 pound section. If your leader is to be tied to a 2 weight or less, you may want to start out with a longer 20 pound butt section instead of using 25 pound.

\*Maxima leader material given in POUND TEST and unlabeled below. Rio tippet is labeled with name and "X" rating.

Tie your own leaders for performance and economy. You can tie a better leader, cheaper. Let's go fishing!

\*when using 8 or 9 weights and heavily weighted flies over size 2, I generally drop the 15# section and go with the first three sections totaling only 27 inches. I use this leader with fast sinking sink tips (15 to 24 feet) to aggressively and rapidly jerk large weighted, saltwater type streamers from a moving driftboat. This takes place in the larger tailwater rivers of east Tennessee below TVA dams with turbines running. Some question the length and diameters. Once the predatory instinct and mood kicks into a large brown trout's head, he doesn't see the leader, only the big fly being rapidly moved. Once a solid hookup is made, the fish IS COMING to the boat. If the hookup involves a small log, it too may be brought into the boat.

#### CHOOSING A FLY-FISHING ROD

So, you have decided that you would like to give fly fishing a try. You probably saw some people out fishing with a fly rod, or maybe you caught a video on You Tube, or happened to watch an outdoor show on TV that featured someone fly fishing. Whatever the motivation, you have decided to give it a try, so off you go to a local fly-fishing shop. You enter the shop and immediately notice an area that has dozens of fly rods lined up against a wall. You start looking at the rods and after a few minutes you realize that you have no idea where to start.

For the novice, trying to select a fly rod can be a daunting endeavor. A reputable fly shop will have salespeople that can help you select a rod that can get you started. They should first ask you several questions before they start showing you any rods in an effort to understand your level of expertise, what fish you want to pursue and where these fish are located (small streams, large rivers, salt water, etc.). If you experience a salesperson that simply starts trying to sell you a high end rod without having attempted to gather any information from you, be aware. Ask for someone else to help you or just find yourself another fly shop.

This article is an effort to provide people with some basic understanding of fly rods and what attributes are important to consider when purchasing a fly rod.

Fly fishing differs from bait and spin fishing in that you will be casting the weight of the fly line, as opposed to bait/spin fishing where you normally add some weight to your monofilament line in order to make a cast. If you look at a catalog from either a rod manufacture or a fly shop, you will notice that the rods are identified by length and weight.

For example, 8 ½ foot 5 wt. The different line weights match the stiffness or load characteristics of the fly rod in order to cast the line. The majority of fly rods fall into the 2-12 weight category and rod lengths typically run from 7½ to 10 feet. The next attribute that is important is the rod action or stiffness. This is referring to how much the rod will flex when casting the line. In any given rod size, some rods may be very stiff near the grip (the "butt" section) and have very flexible tips, while others will flex in the mid-section of the rod, and others are more consistently stiff throughout their entire length.

Manufactures tend to use different terminology to identify the rod action but in general you can think of it as the rod action is either "full' flex, "mid" flex, or "tip" flex. The rods action becomes important once you decide on what type of fish you are pursuing.

Let's assume that an individual is interested in fishing for trout in streams and small rivers. The fish most likely will be small and the casting distance in the 20–40-foot range. Most of the time small flies (sizes 14-20) will be utilized and in the case of dry flies a light and delicate presentation will be required. The fish probably won't be very large so you would not require a rod with a stiff butt section to fight the fish. Relatively short casting distances, delicate presentations and small fish would require a rod that is in the 2-4 weight range with an action that is "full" or "mid" flex. If you feel that you might spend some time on a slightly bigger river with the potential of hooking larger fish, then maybe a 5-weight rod would be a good overall compromise. (SEE NEXT PAGE)

Let's take another example, only this time the target fish will be bonefish. In this scenario you will now have to contend with wind, much longer casts, heavier flies, and a fish that can reach up to 10 pounds and can attain speeds up to 30 mph. This is going to require a rod that is much stiffer, allowing you to cast the heavier flies at a greater distance and to fight and the fish once you have it hooked. In this case a rod that is 8-9 weight with an action that is more in line with a "tip" flex rod.

These days fly rods are manufactured utilizing carbon graphite fiber. But you can still find rods made with split bamboo, also known as cane, and some manufactures are now offering fiber glass rods too. Cane rods are very expensive mainly because they are labor intensive to produce, but by the very nature of the material a bamboo rod will provide a more classic slow action casting experience. If the casting experience of a bamboo rod is what you prefer but you don't want to incur the cost of a bamboo rod, then you might want to try a fiber glass rod. It will emulate the action of a bamboo rod but is much more affordable.

The majority of fly rods produced today come as four-piece rods. There are some that are three pieces and six pieces, the six-piece rods are a great solution for the angler that likes to travel by air to his selected fishing destination.

When it comes to price, the angler can spend as little as \$100 or as much as \$1,000. Some manufactures market only high-end rods while others market a wide range of rods in an effort to cover all price points.

For example, Orvis has starter sets that start around \$169 for a rod, reel and line while their top of the line Helios rods are approaching \$1,000 just for the rod.

Finally, check to see if the manufacturer provides a warranty and what the warranty covers.

And one initial thought that I would like to pass along: Once you have narrowed your search to a particular rod make sure that you cast the rod before purchasing it. If you are at a fly shop, they will provide you with the rod and allow you to cast it in a designated area outside the shop. If you have settled on an 8 ½ foot 5 weight rod, cast rods from different companies until you find one that feels comfortable to you. If this is your first time trying to purchase a fly rod, it might be difficult for you to feel a big difference between rods but that's okay. You just want to make sure that you didn't miss the one rod that might have made a difference. If you happen to live in an area that does not have a local fly shop and your only option is to go through a mail order establishment, make sure they will allow you to return the rod if you don't like the way it feels once you receive the rod.

For budding anglers interested in giving fly fishing a try, fly fishing clubs offer a great serviced from the perspective that you will have access to people that have years of experience and can provide you with great advice and support. Trying to master the sport on your own can turn out to be a very frustrating experience, but with access to people that can advise and teach you what probably took them years to acquire, you will have a much more rewarding fly fishing experience.

## Dornan's Water Walker

# **September 6, 2023** Fly Tying Meeting IHOP - San Luis Obispo at 6:30 PM



The next fly tying class is being held on September 6th at 6:30 PM at IHOP at 212 Madonna Road in SLO. Jim Snodgrass will demonstrate how to tie Dornan's Water Walker. This is a very versatile stonefly that does one thing really well---look like a stonefly when viewed from underneath the fly. The "original" Water Walker was developed by Will Dornan, a native of Jackson Hole, Wyoming.

The Water Walker imitates a stonefly. The fly floats low on the water and has knotted rubber legs that come alive in the water. Foam is added over the back and in the wing to help the fly float. This foam body and wing ensures that the fly floats like a cork, and the rubber legs are perfectly placed to imitate a stonefly swimming in the water.

This fly also works well when grass hoppers are about. Because the Water Walkers are so buggy looking, it can be used as an attractor. You can change the size and colors on this fly, depending on the time of the year and the color of the local stoneflies.

#### **Materials:**

All materials will be supplied for the \$3 material fee, but be sure and bring Sally Hanson Hard as Nails and UNI 6/0 black thread. The following are the materials that will be used for the Water Walker:

- Hook TMC 206 BL#12; or TMC 2457, 2487, 2488 "curved hooks" size #12
- Thread –UNI 6/o black
- Over Body i mm black foam
- Flash Krystal Flash, smolt blue #20
- Body Peacock ice dubbing
- Legs Black round rubber legs, small
- Wing -0.5mm razor foam, tan or white
- Indicator 2mm foam-white for tan wing, orange for white wing

#### **Notes:**

All materials will be supplied except the thread. Bring UNI 6/0 thread, color black.

- Please RSVP if you will be attending so I can make enough tying material packets for everyone.

- There will be a **free raffle** for fly tying material at this fly tying session.

## **TENKARA CLINIC**

## EASTERN SIERRA - OCTOBER 19-20

The Tenkara Clinic is scheduled for October 19-20 and will be led by Pat Yeager of Eastern Sierra Guide Services. We will gather on the morning of the 19<sup>th</sup> in the town of Mammoth Lakes from where Pat will decide on the best location based on the prevailing river/stream





The clinic will give the beginner the basics of the centuries old Japanese technique in small stream fishing. This will include dry-land instructions in how to use the collapsable rod and how to cast the fixed line effectively. Since the clinic will be restricted to a maximum of 6 participants there will be plenty of one-on-one instruction by Pat including plenty of stream fishing during the two half-day sessions.

The cost for the two ½ days of instruction is \$800 (+tip) for the group to be divided by the number of participants. The fee includes the use of loaner rods for those without one.

I will need to have at least 4 confirmed members by October 1, otherwise the clinic will be canceled.

I plan on fishing the local waters around Mammoth a couple of days before the start of the clinic and invite any member to join me.

I recommend for those who want to learn more about tenkara fishing two books: Daniel Galharado's "Tenkara" (Amazon \$24) and Yvon Chouinard's "Simple Fly Fishing" (Amazon \$24).

Please contact me if your are interested in attending the clinic. As soon as there are six confirmed participants, the trip will be closed.




