Druid Arch, Needles District, Canyonlands National Park

When we look outside of California for other amazing places to visit in the Western States of the US, I have repeatedly been drawn to the desert beauty of Southern Utah. The "Mighty Five" National Parks in Utah each have their own magnificence (and crowds) but I could not wait to get back this spring to Canyonlands NP. Canyonlands is the least visited of the five, so it offers the solace and serenity that many of us crave. Moab is the centerpiece of this regional area, which is anything but calm, but offers access to all sorts of adventures.

Canyonlands consists of three distinct districts. The first District, Island in The Sky, like Arches NP and Dead Horse Point State Park, are all relatively close to Moab. Therefore, they feel the pressure of the crowds year-round. The second District, the Maze (of Aron Ralston fame in the movie 127 hours) is the least visited and very remote. Finally, there is The Needles District, with its unfathomable geological formations that seem almost cartoonlike.

This was my third time visiting The Needles District and I wanted to backpack in and spend a few nights at Chesler Park. Reasonably reachable on a long day hike, camping overnight in Dark Sky Country amplifies the experience of this magical part of our country. The only issue is lack of water. Sure, I could clog up my water filter in a greenish pool at the end of Elephant Canyon, but I didn't want to go that route. So, we brought all our water with us: 7 liters per person to be exact, for three days and two nights. That's a lot of extra weight to carry on the way in, but so what. The ability of carrying everything that you need on your back while stepping into the wilderness, is to me, beyond compare.

You may wonder why I am bringing this trip up when it has nothing to do with fly fishing, but we are all more than just anglers. A real appreciation of the wonders of nature is where we all started.

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MANZANITA LAKE OUTING UPDATE June 22 to 27

This majestic place with its snow-covered alpine peaks and natural beauty, wild trout and quality fishing bring us back year after year.

IMPORTANT UPDATES:

For the moment, there are still campsites available with only two consequence days open. You can book for a maximum of 5 days in the park!

The snowpack is less than the two previous years, this can give more vegetation growth and better fishing over the weed beds at outing time.

For those new to the lake, or if you want to try to step up your still-water knowledge to a higher level, then Manzanita is the place to be. We have a few members in the outing with 25 to 30 years of Manzanita experience who can help you to become more productive. We also have available a daily short open meeting around 5 pm in camp site C1, where we all can talk about our fishing day, discuss and plan some changes in fishing tactics to be more productive the next day if needed!

Lance Gray, our banquet speaker, did a great job by giving as part of his program a lot of good info about Manzanita lake. Hopefully this has convinced you to come to the outing!

WHERE: Manzanita Lake, Lassen National Park (north entrance). Take Hwy CA 44 east out of Redding.

ACCOMODATIONS: Camping near the lake (no hook ups). Motels are in Shingletown, about 14 miles towards Redding.

RESERVATIONS: <u>recreation.gov</u> or call 1-877-444-6777.

In general, from Monday to Friday are the days to fish the lake, with almost no people around you engaging in other watersports. On the weekends there can be too many people canoeing the lake to have a productive enjoyable fishing day.

The fishing is primarily done in 4 to 8 ft of water over submerged weed-beds. With the lower snowpack, the water can warm up a bit faster, providing more food for the fish. The chance of good dry fly activity on wind still days becomes better and better as the days progress into late June.

Most of us begin to fish around mid-morning and stop by mid-afternoon. In general, fishing is slow between 3:30 and 7:00 pm. This will give you ample time to have dinner and be ready for the evening fishing. If the fishing gods were not on your side during the day, you still have a good shot of great fishing in the evening. The lake comes back to life when the sun is of the water around 7:30. Dry-fly activity starts at that time with improving results later in the evening until dark. During this low light period, the fish are much less picky and easier to fool; what was (for some) hard to achieve during the day is now working well. At the same time, 8 to 9:30 pm, stripping a dark medium size wooly-or seal bugger can be very productive, translating to many violent strikes from mostly brown trout. This is a great way to end your fishing day.

A floating device is the best way to go, but there are many good spots around this 80 acre lake which can be fished productively from shore.

TACKLE: 4 to 6 wt 9 to 9-1/2 ft rod. Floating line for dry fly fishing

Hover line = 1 ips for nymphing and leeches. Camo intermediate line 1-1/2 to 2 ips can be used in deeper spots during the day, or for stripping Wooly Buggers at dark.

LEADERS: A longer leader is more productive than one too short.

Note: Generally, use a leader length that you can comfortably cast that turns the fly over! Ten foot is ok, 11-12 ft (tippet included) or more is better for during the day. Use 4 to 5x fluorocarbon for nymphing, 5 to 7x fluoro for dry fly.

When the sun is off the water (evening) use a 10 ft leader for drys 4 to 5 x For stripping WB at dark use 9 ft tippet including 3X!

DRY FLIES: parachute Adams, female Adams, Callibaetis cripples, duns, and emergers, all in

size 14 to 18. Black Ants size 12 to 14.

NYMPHS: Callibaetis/gold ribbed Hare's ear, and flashbacks/Birdsnest/Pheasant tail/

Prince nymphs 14 to 16. Damsels olive 12 to 14

Chironomids - Zebra/Tiger in black or red, size 18 to 20.

STREAMERS and LEECHES:

Daytime - Wooly Bugger olive size 10 to 12

Late evening - Wooly or Seal Bugger dark brown or black size 8 to 10.

A fishing license is REQUIRED, as is a life jacket if you use a boat of any sort.

We plan to have a dinner get-together Wednesday from 6 to 6:45 pm in C1?

If you have any questions don't hesitate to call me before May 15th at 805-489-3085

Let me know before May 15th if you are coming. I'll be on a fishing trip after that date, and most of the time will be hard to reach!

I'll be arriving at Manzanita on Monday June 23rd. in loop C, site C1

I hope to see you at Manzanita!


An individual regular membership is \$45.00 per year for 12 months (January through December).











